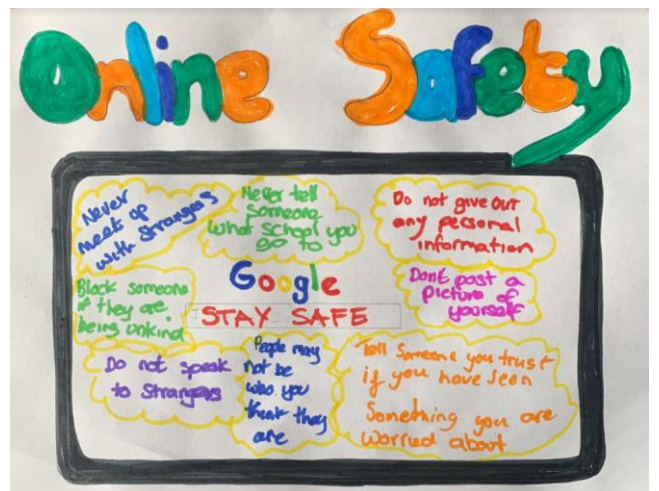
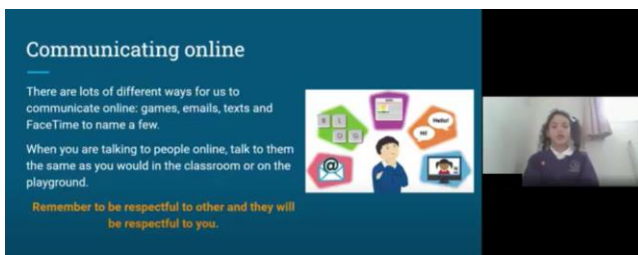
This year Safer Internet Day was about exploring reliability in the online world and creating an internet that we can trust. In our meeting, we discussed ways that we can be the solution to this: we have the chance to show people how to be respectful on the internet and how to check if our research is reliable.

On Safer Internet Day, we hosted an assembly to share our knowledge with the rest of the school. This included information about different areas of technology and our top tips, which we have included in the newsletter.



Our top tips for learning online:

- Don't share your Google Classroom code.
- Only follow links to trusted websites.
- If you can't turn in your work, take a screenshot that you can submit instead.
- Email your teacher your work if you can't hand it in or take a screenshot
- Make sure you are respectful in lessons by turning your microphone off, having your camera on and using the raise hand icon if you would like to answer a question or contribute to the lesson.



Top tips for being safe online:

- Only communicate with people that you know in the real world when you are online.
- Choose safe user names (try not to include your name, birthday or address)
- Look for the 'S' in HTTPS, this shows that the website is trusted.
- Ask for your grown-ups permission before going online.
- Block unkind words.
- Encourage your grown-ups to play games with you online.
- If you have done everything you can to protect yourself online and someone says something unkind or you see something that makes you feel upset you can minimise the screen or press the home button. Then you can show your trusted adult.
